FOREST GLOSSARY / TERMINOLOGY

<p>Allowable Annual Cut (AAC):</p> <p>Backlog:</p> <p>Clearcutting:</p> <p>Coniferous:</p> <p>Crown Land:</p> <p>Cut Block:</p> <p>Deciduous:</p> <p>Forest:</p> <p>Forest Inventory:</p> <p>Forest Management Cycle:</p> <p>Forest Renewal:</p> <p>Fuelwood:</p> <p>Harvesting:</p> <p>Integrated Resource Management:</p> <p>Logging Plan:</p> <p>Managed Forest Land:</p>	<p>The average volume of wood which may be harvested annually under sustained yield management.</p> <p>A term applied to forest land areas where silviculture treatments such as planting and site preparation are overdue. Planting is considered backlog if more than five years have elapsed since a site was cleared (by harvest or fire) in the Interior and more than 3 years on the Coast.</p> <p>The harvesting of all trees from an area of forest land in a single cut (see also cut block).</p> <p>Cone-bearing trees having needles or scale-like leaves, usually evergreen, and producing wood known commercially as 'soft-woods'.</p> <p>Land that is owned by the Crown, or Province. Referred to as federal Crown land when it is owned by Canada.</p> <p>A specific area with defined boundaries authorized for harvest.</p> <p>Term applied to trees, commonly broadleaf, that shed their leaves annually. Also known commercially as 'hardwoods.'</p> <p>A plant community predominately of trees and other woody vegetation growing more closely together.</p> <p>A survey of a forest area to collect such data as area condition, timber volume and species, for specific purposes such as planning, purchase, evaluation, management, or harvesting.</p> <p>The phases that occur in the management of a forest including harvesting, site preparation, reforestation, and stand tending.</p> <p>The renewal of tree crop by either natural regeneration or tree planting.</p> <p>Trees used for the production of firewood logs or other wood fuel.</p> <p>The cutting and removal of trees from a forest area.</p> <p>The management of two or more resources in the same general area, commonly includes water, soil, timber, range, fish, wildlife, and recreation.</p> <p>A schedule of operations for a specific area that describes in words and on a map how and where harvesting will take place.</p> <p>Forest land that is being managed under a forest management plan.</p>	<p>Mechantable Timber:</p> <p>Natural Regeneration:</p> <p>Non-Forest Land:</p> <p>NSR (<i>not satisfactorily restocked</i>):</p> <p>Reforestation:</p> <p>Second Growth:</p> <p>Silviculture Basic:</p> <p><i>Intensive/Incremental Silviculture:</i></p> <p><i>Silviculture System:</i></p> <p>Stand:</p> <p>Stumpage:</p> <p>Stumpage Appraisal:</p> <p>Sustained Yield:</p> <p>Tenure:</p> <p>Tree Farm Licence:</p>	<p>A tree or stand that has attained sufficient size, quality and/or volume to make it suitable for harvesting.</p> <p>The renewal of a tree crop by natural regeneration, e.g. seed on-site from adjacent stands, or brought in by wind, birds, or animals.</p> <p>Land not primarily intended for growing or supporting a forest.</p> <p>Productive forest land that has been denuded and has failed partially or completely to regenerate.</p> <p>The restocking (i.e. planting, seeding) of an area with forest trees. Also called forest regeneration.</p> <p>A forest that grows after harvest of the original mature old-growth forest.</p> <p>The science of growing and tending a forest.</p> <p>A term that refers to the treatments carried out to maintain or increase the yield and value of forest stands. Including harvesting, regeneration and tending of forest over time, spacing, pruning and fertilization. Also known as incremental silviculture.</p> <p>A process following accepted silvicultural conditions whereby forests are tended, harvested, and replaced.</p> <p>A community of trees sufficiently uniformed in species, age, arrangement or condition to be distinguishable as a group from the forest or other growth on the area.</p> <p>The price that must be paid to the provincial government for timber harvested from Crown Land.</p> <p>The process by which the stumpage to be charged for harvesting on any given area is estimated.</p> <p>A method of forest management that calls for an approximate balance between net growth and amount harvested.</p> <p>The holding, particularly as to manner or term (i.e. period of time), of a property. Land tenure may be broadly categorized into private lands, federal lands, and provincial Crown lands. The Forest Act defines a number of forestry tenures by which the cutting of timber and other user rights to Crown land are assigned</p> <p>A form of tenure agreement which allows the long-term practice of sound forest management and harvesting on Crown land or on a combination of Crown and private land by private interests under the supervision of the Forest Service.</p>
